The competition prize was a generously sized hamper from Jack Roe, and this was presented to Paul at the Borderlines Film Festival in Hereford. Paul was amongst Jack Roe's other guests at the company's Film Sponsorship evening at The Courtyard in Hereford.

After the presentation to Paul, guests were served champagne and then had a buffet meal before the screening. There were two films shown at the screening. Firstly there was a short film directed by and starring Buster Keaton (Neighbours), with Virginia Fox.

This was followed by "Man with a Movie Camera", an interesting film made in the same year that Jack Roe started trading (1929). Man with a Movie Camera, or Living Russia is an experimental 1929 silent documentary film, by Russian director Dziga Vertov, edited by his wife Elizaveta Svilova, giving a view of Russian life in the late 1920s, accompanied by a large amount of Stalinist and anti nazi propaganda.
